## What We Heard Report

Each year the Royal Canadian Mounted Police (RCMP) deploy their resources based on an Annual Performance Plan (APP). The APP is a strategic blend of provincial and local priorities intended to reflect the public safety priorities of our community. The online survey results will help determine the local policing priorities for Okotoks Municipal Enforcement (OME) and the RCMP in 2022. The survey ended on Feb. 28. Thank you for taking the survey!

Not everyone has the same definitions of what crime means in our community and we may have different perceptions and expectations. As an Okotokian, this survey is a chance to help prioritize what is important for Okotoks and our community.

## This survey focused on three (3) themes:

1. Community perceptions of public safety during the last year (2021)
2. How the community feels about the current state of safety and crime in Okotoks
3. Community priorities for public safety for the coming year in Okotoks

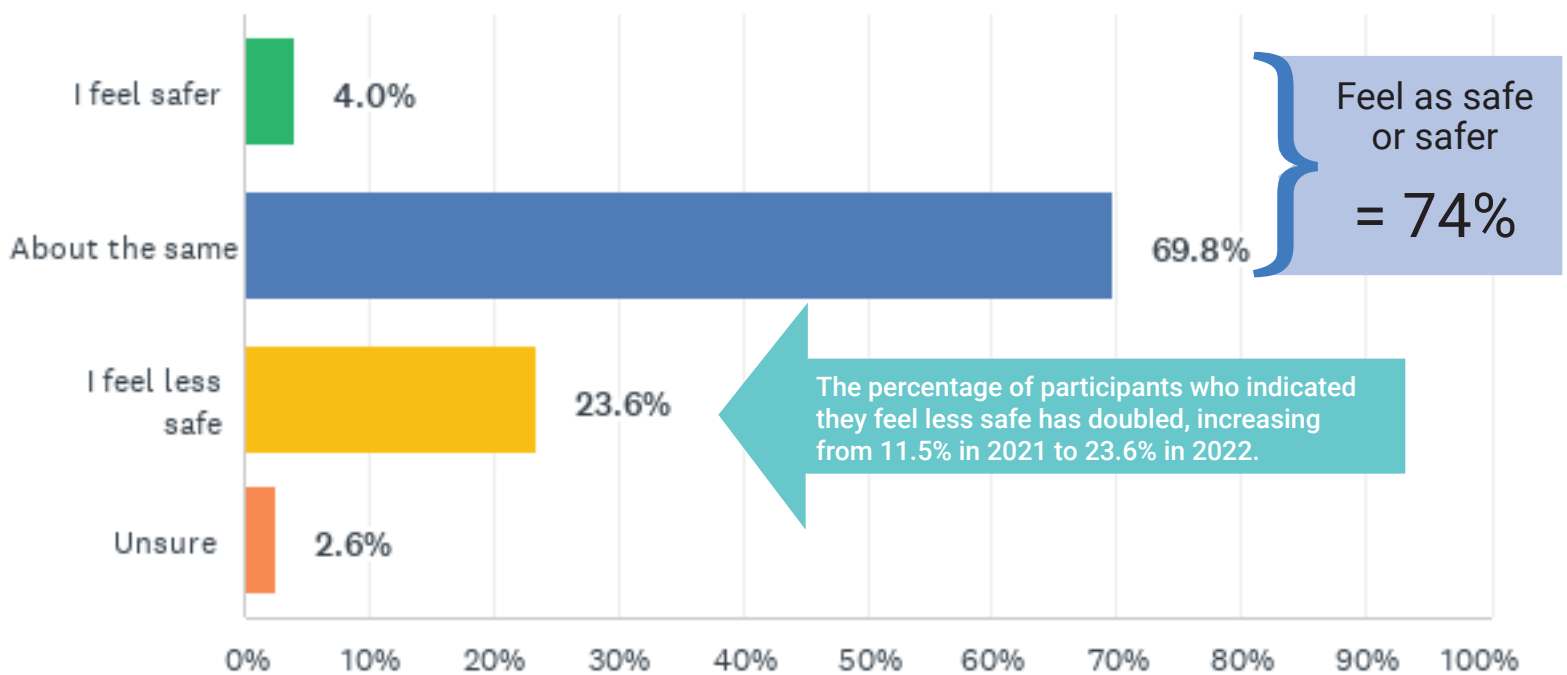

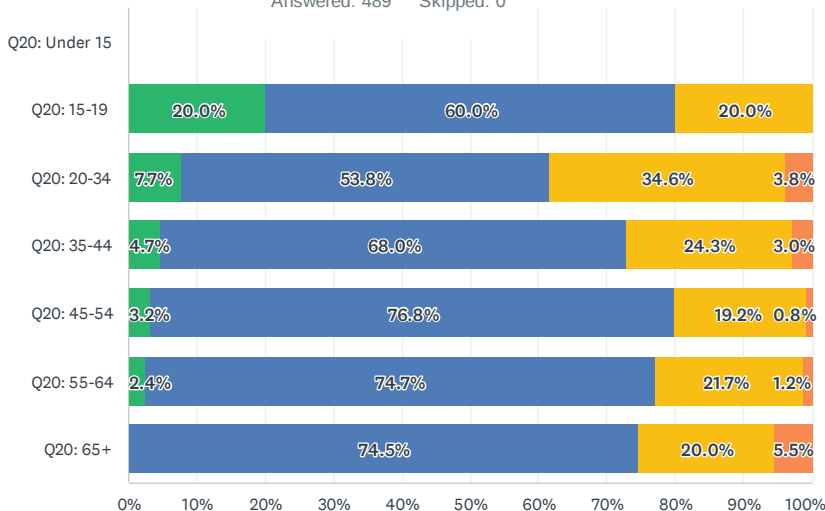

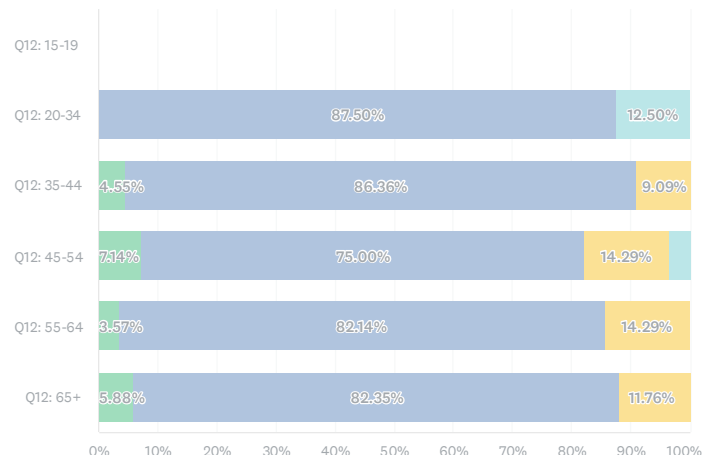

### When comparing respondent's perception of safety related to their age:

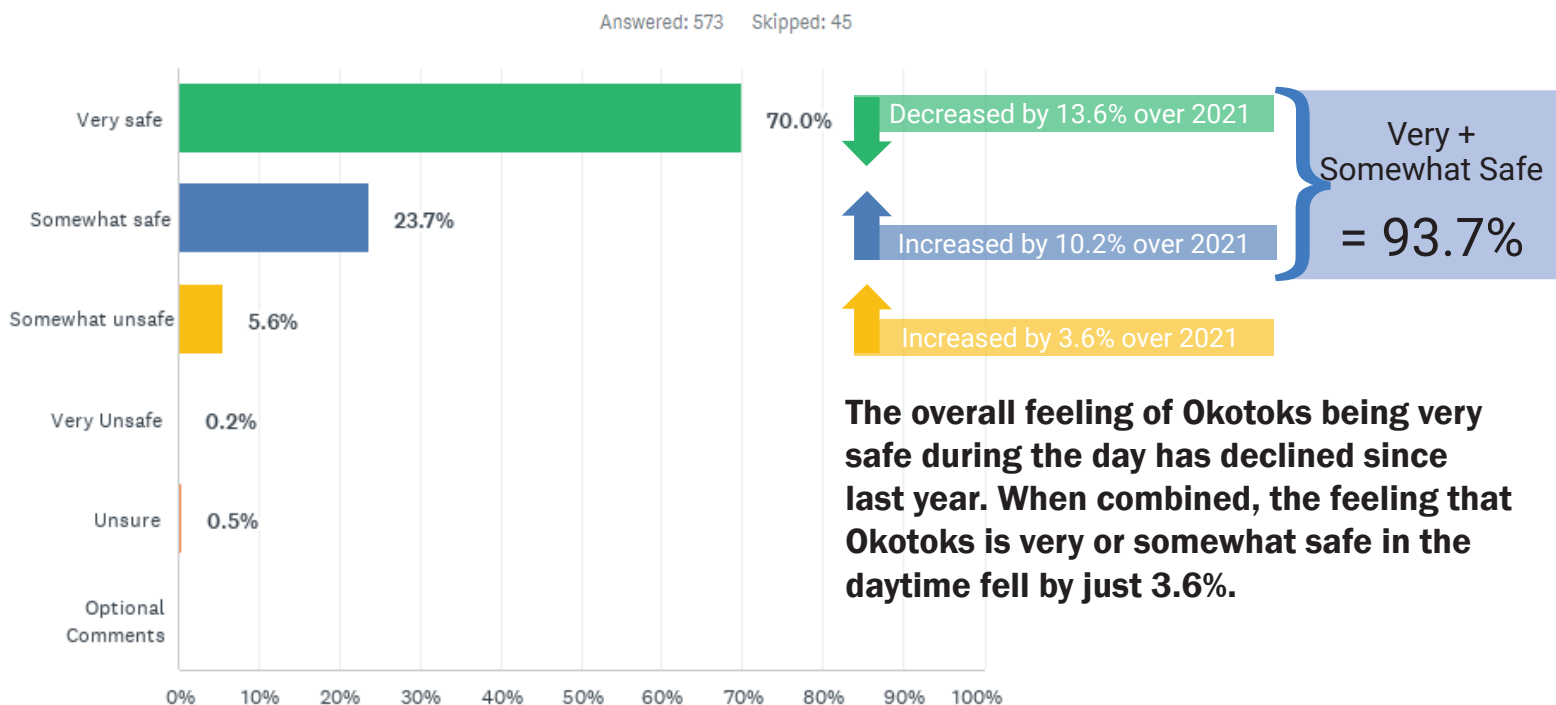

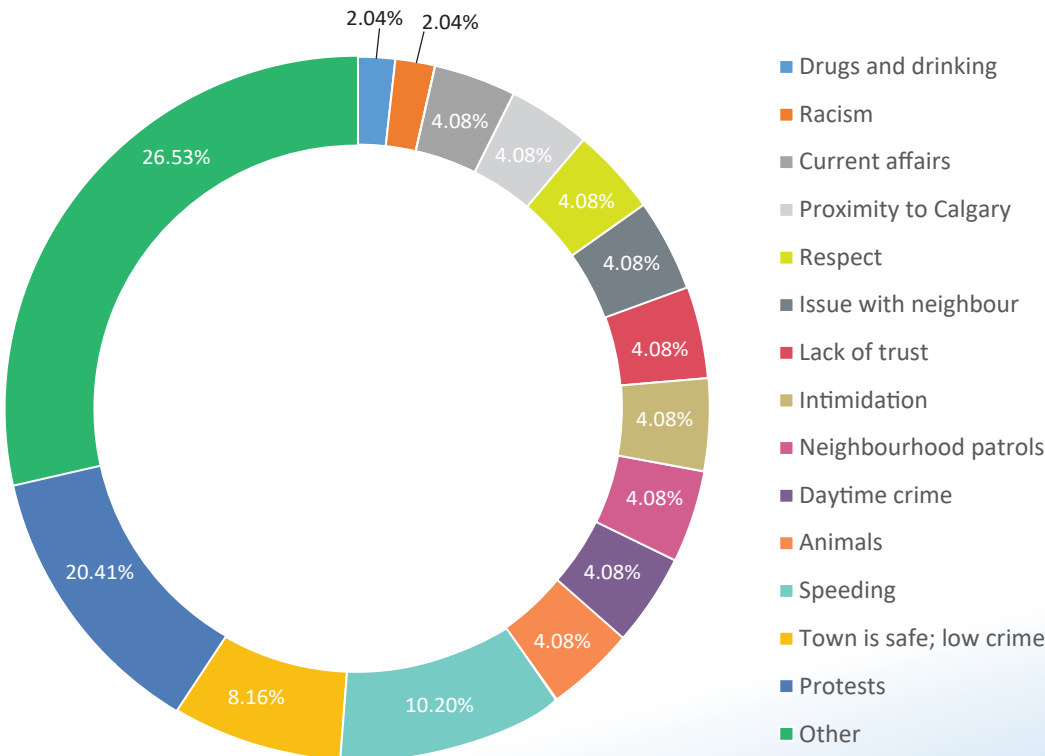

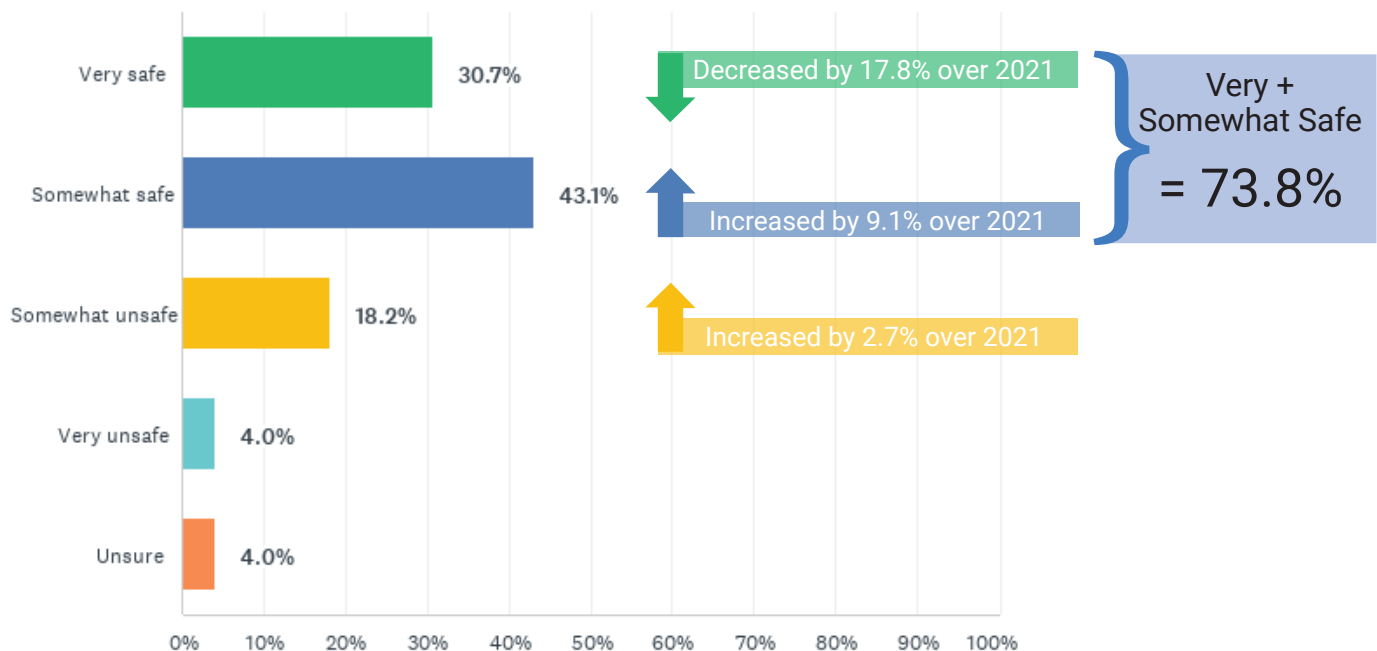

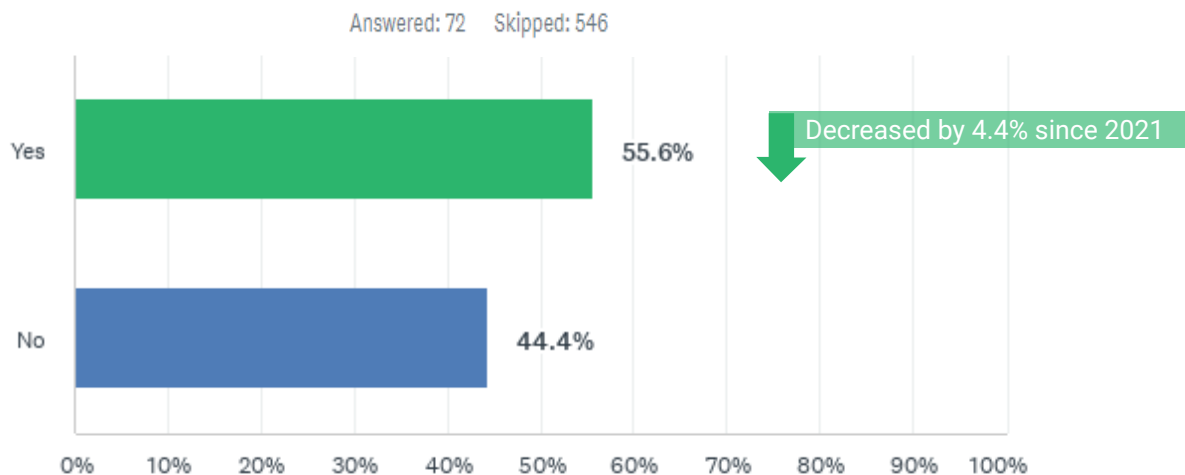

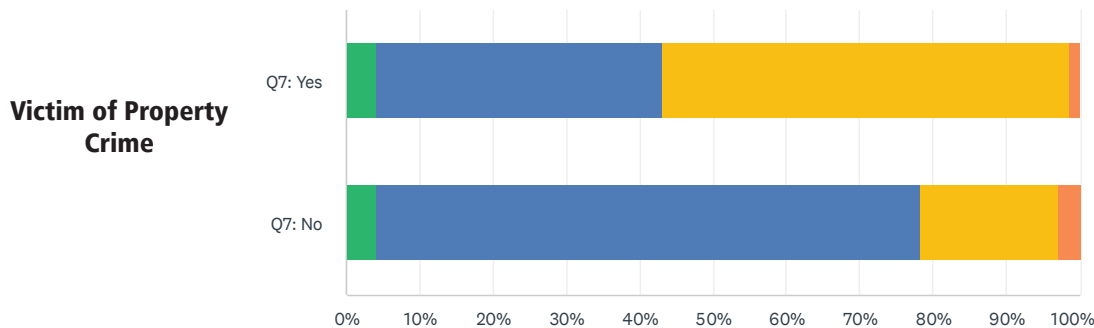

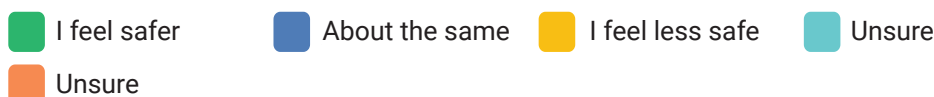

**Those who experienced property crime were much more likely to indicate they feel less safe:**

- Of those 72 individuals who indicated they were a direct victim of property crime, nearly 56% indicated they felt less safe, while 43% indicated they still feel about the same or safer.
- For those 501 individuals who weren't a victim of property crime, 19% felt less safe, while 78% felt about the same or safe.



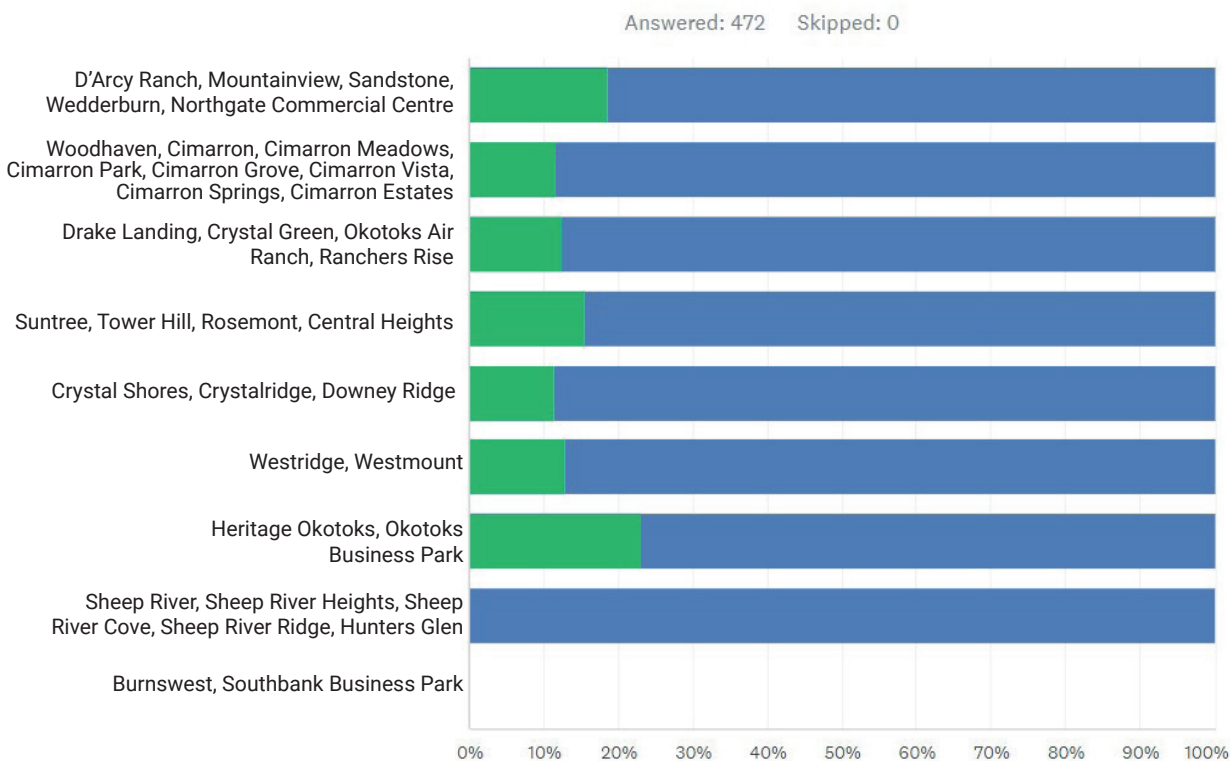

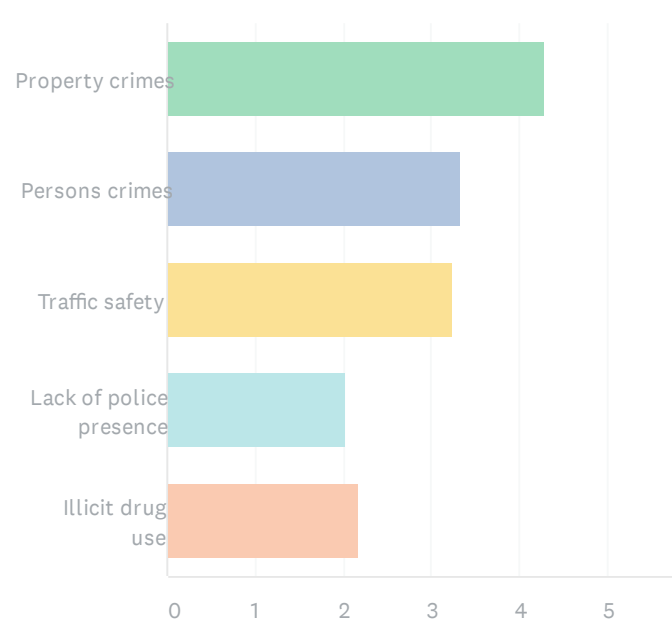



## 2021 Prioritizing Issues COMPARISON

### Top priorities comparison from 2021 to 2022:

When comparing respondent priorities from last year to this year, here are the highlights:

- 
- 
- Property crime remains the #1 priority for the 2<sup>nd</sup> year in a row.
  - Crime reduction strategies fell from the 2<sup>nd</sup> most important issue in 2021 to 6<sup>th</sup> in 2022.
  - Violent Crimes Against Persons fell from 3<sup>rd</sup> to 10<sup>th</sup> in the priority list.
  - Distracted Driving fell from 4<sup>th</sup> to 8<sup>th</sup> priority.
  - Youth Engagement remained consistent as the 5<sup>th</sup> priority, with 49% of respondents indicating it is a significant priority.



### 2021 Comparison

**Top 5 concerns: Property crime (64%), Crime Reduction Strategies (51%), Violent Crimes Against Persons (49%), Distracted driving (46%), and Youth Engagement (48%).**

### Significant + Somewhat Significant:

When looking at the priorities in combining significant and somewhat significant rankings, the top 6 priorities remain the same, although crime reduction strategies moves up to the 2<sup>nd</sup> position and Community/neighbourhood engagement moved up in priority from 12<sup>th</sup> to 10<sup>th</sup> position:

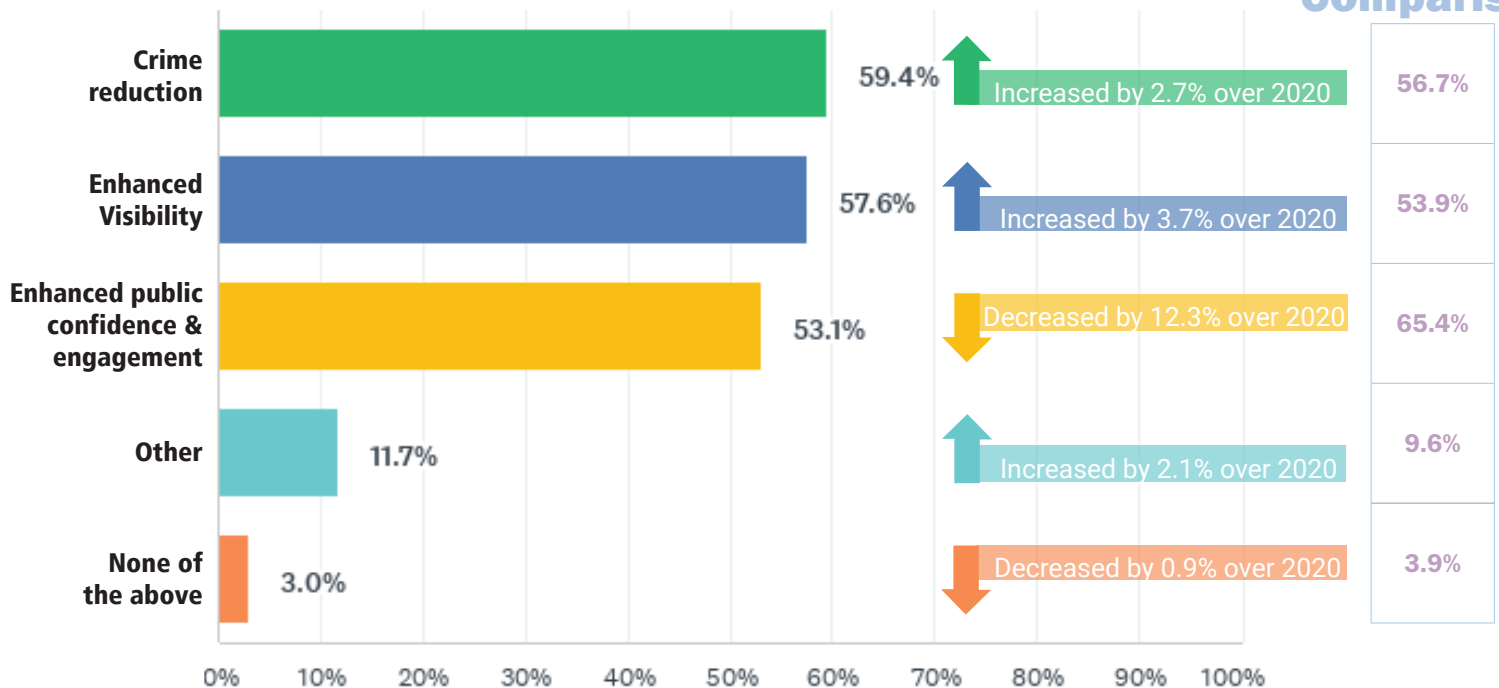

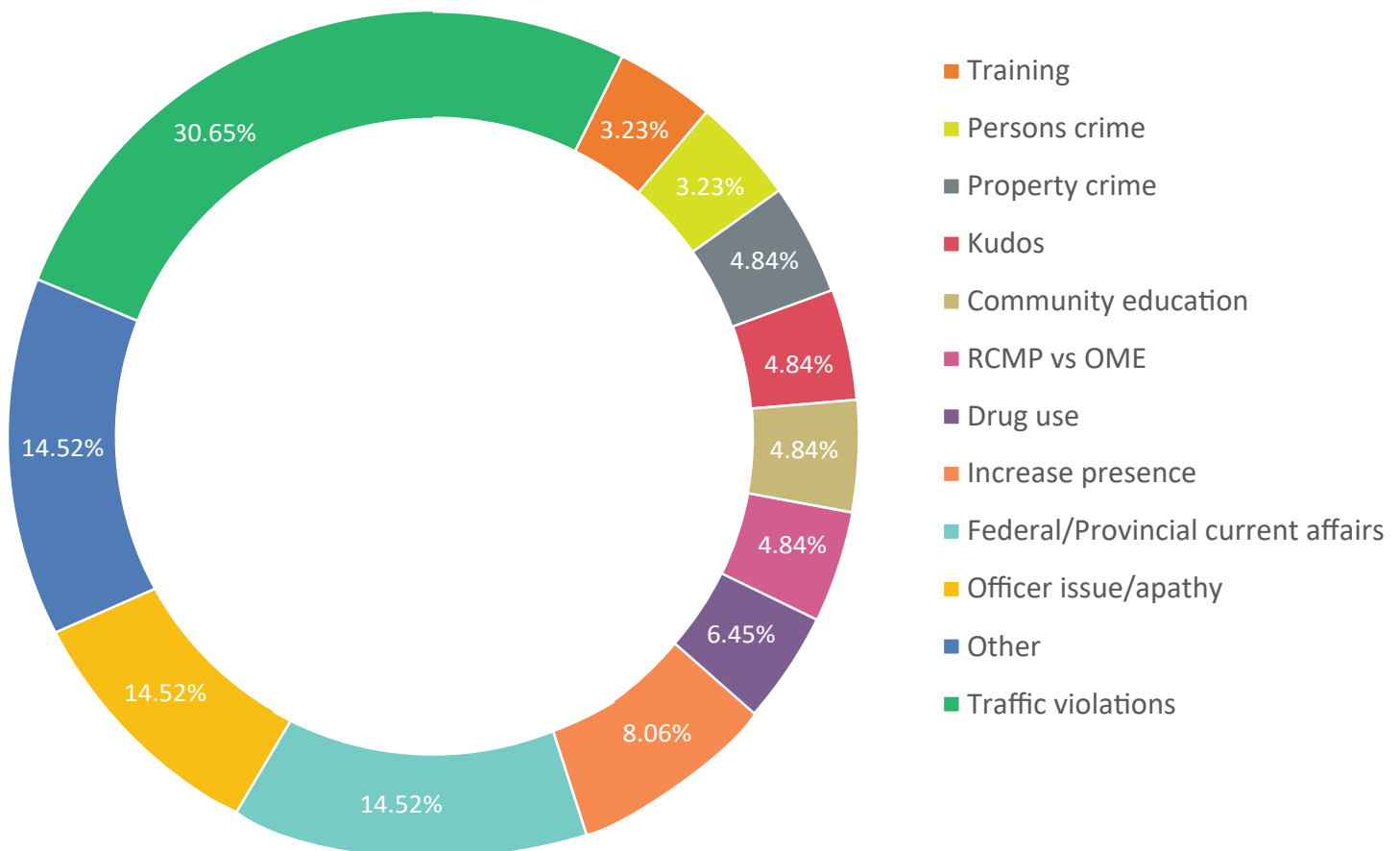

- 8.0% Increased presence

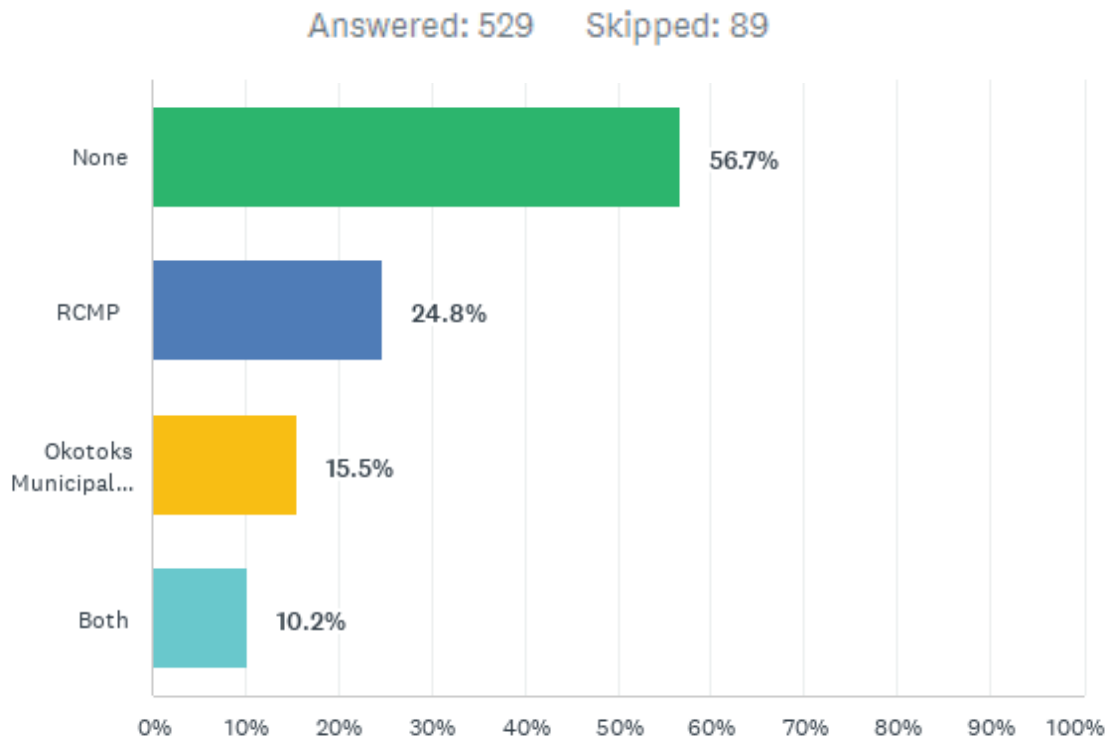

Have you had any interactions with the local RCMP or Municipal Enforcement in the last 12 months? (Select all that apply)



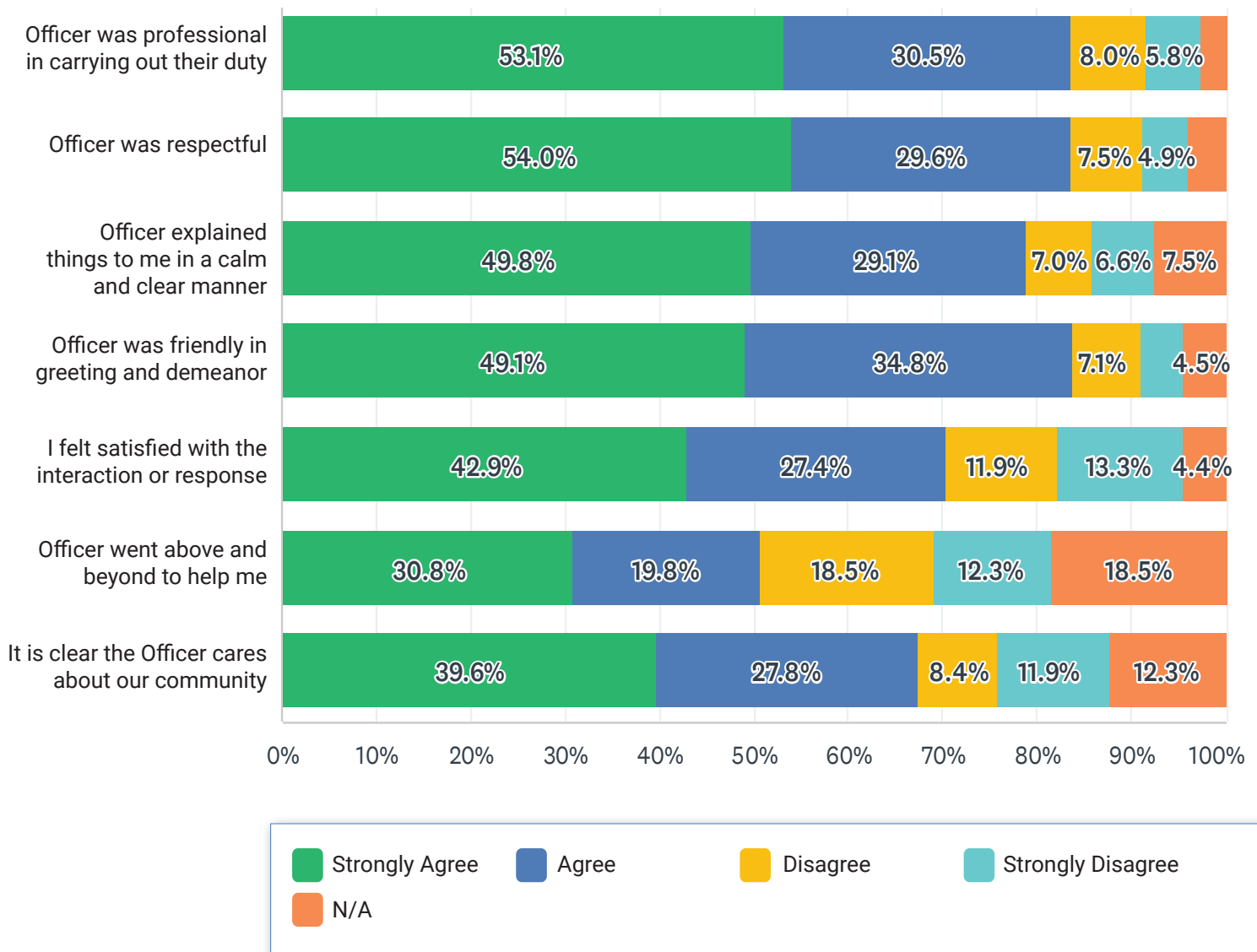

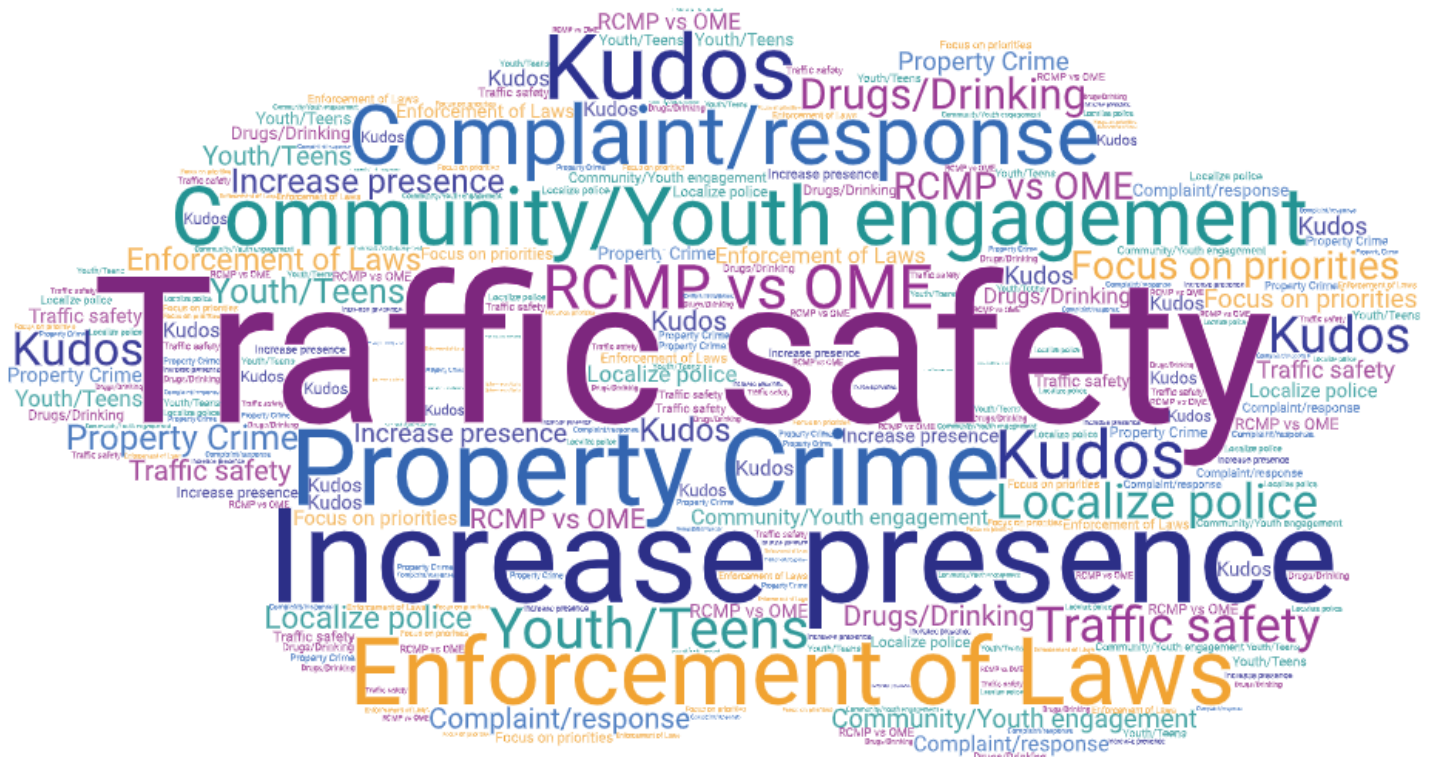

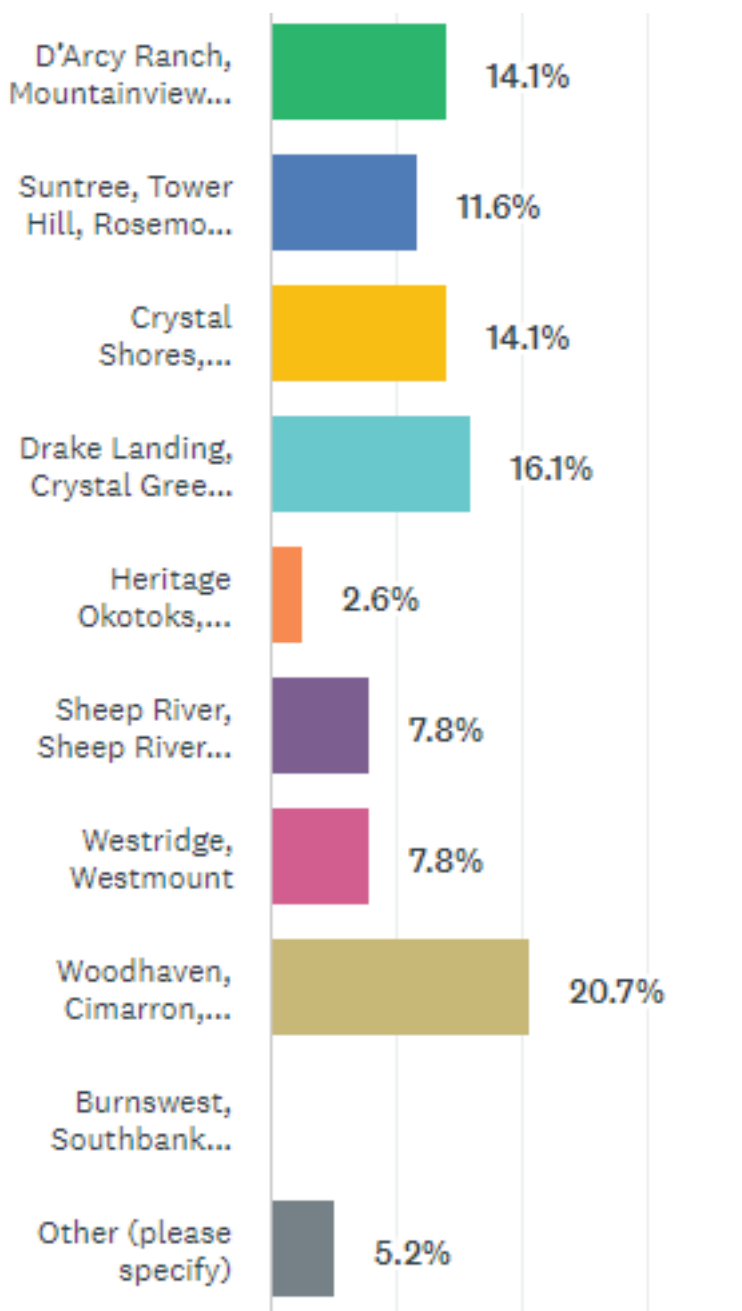

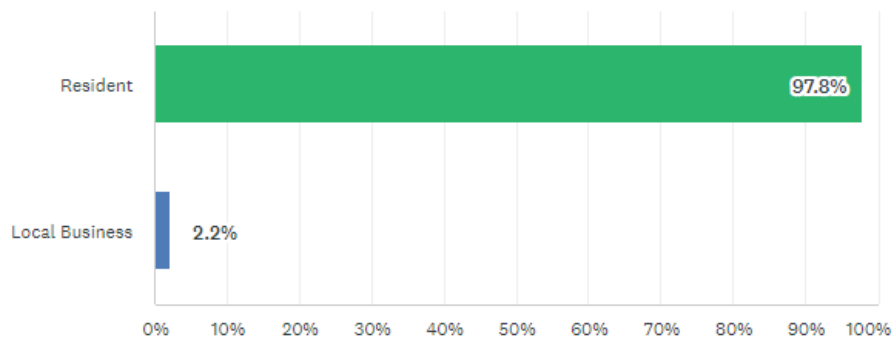

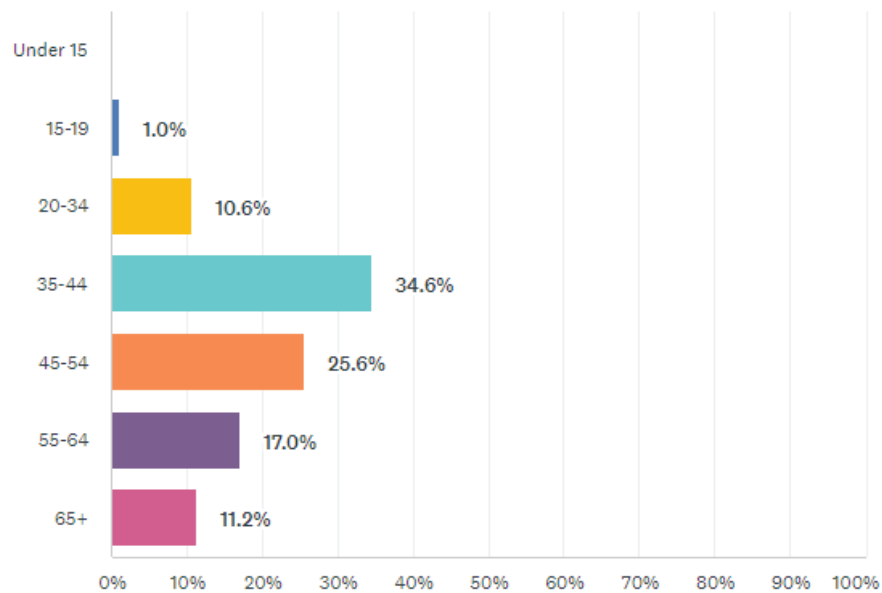

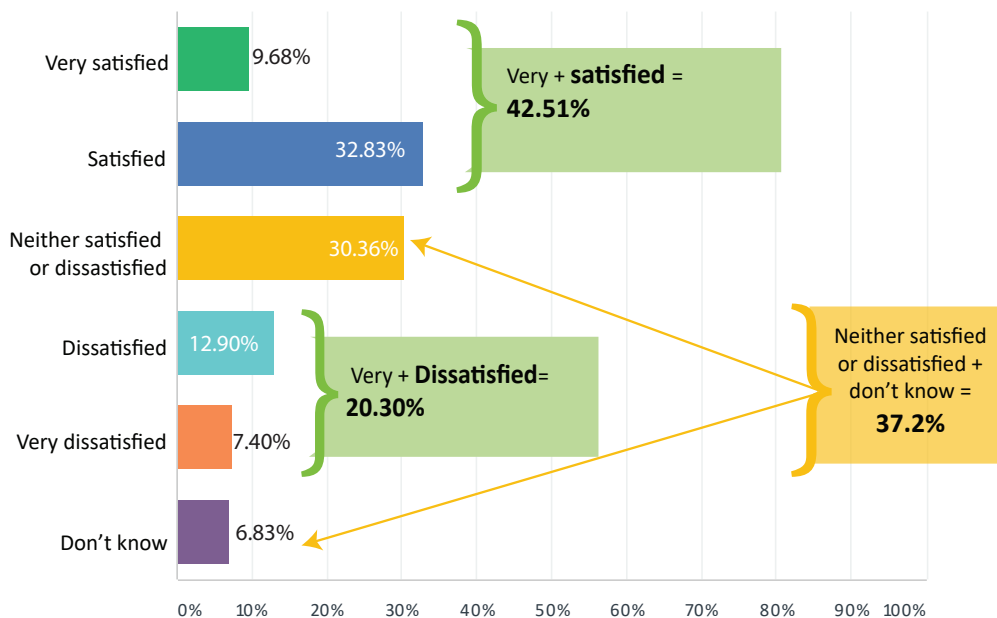
