- Public education and fire prevention by delivering community awareness programs, and safety codes inspections to businesses on an annual basis
- Emergency response to fires, alarms, water and ice rescues, natural disasters, hazardous materials incidents and transportation incidents in and around Okotoks 24/7
- Support the Town's EMS partners by responding to medical emergencies
- Coordinate planning and provision of Emergency Management in cooperation with all protective and support services, Emergency Management Alberta and mutual aid partners, including corporate business continuation planning



What We Deliver

- Provide bylaw education that encourages compliance
- Enforce provincial statutes as appointed (e.g. Alberta Traffic Safety Act), and municipal bylaws.
- Maintain peace and good order within the community, mediate neighbour disputes and encourage reasonable tolerance and respect for one another
- Responding to requests, inquiries, complaints for animals within the Town of Okotoks
 Urban limits for the protection of animal's through the Okotoks "Responsible Pet Ownership
 Bylaw" as well as Dog Search for found dogs by tag number available on the Okotoks
 website.



What We Deliver

- Payment processing of Parking permits, Alarm Fines and Noise Permits
- Municipal Enforcement Complaint Line 24/7/365. An investigating officer is assigned to a complaint
- Planning and implementation of the collection of transportation data that is used for network growth analysis and safety such as traffic control and pedestrian crossings
- Management of found property as stated in the Municipal Government Act

- Cell operations on Northridge Drive. As well as various tasks at 32nd street bridge.


