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WHAT WE HEARD REPORT (PART 1)

Public Art in Okotoks

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PREAMBLE

During the Alberta Centennial year in 2005, the Town of Okotoks Culture and Heritage Services conducted a Sculpture Symposium. Three sculptors created sandstone sculptures and suddenly Okotoks had a small public art collection.

On October 24, 2005, Okotoks Town Council approved Public Arts Program Guidelines (The Program) to provide direction for the acquisition, placement, maintenance and de-accession of public art works. The report recommended that the Town of Okotoks "begin the process towards" establishing The Program that would increase awareness, understanding, and acceptance of public art and involve community in the process of enhancing public space.



"The Town of Okotoks recognizes that the arts contribute to the quality of life of its citizens." -- Public Art Guidelines

The Program included two key sections:

- **1.** Establishing a Public Art Advisory Committee as a sub-committee of the Culture, Parks, and Recreation Committee.
- 2. Establishing a maintenance fund.

Neither of these recommendations occurred for the following reasons:

- **1.** Changes in management took place in Culture & Heritage Services between 2005 and 2009 and priorities shifted.
- **2.** The Town of Okotoks assessed committee structures in 2013 and reduced the number of committees, making the establishment of a Public Art Advisory Committee contrary to direction.
- **3.** The Town of Okotoks again analyzed committee structures in 2018 and reduced the number to key governance committees in favour of focusing on public engagement and specialized task forces.



PREAMBLE CONTINUED

Even without the formal establishment of the actions suggested in The Program, the Town of Okotoks has taken on numerous public art projects including:

- **1.** The permanent mounting of the three sculptures created at the symposium at the Okotoks Art Gallery (2 sculptures) and the Okotoks Public Library (1 sculpture)
- 2. The donation of twenty original Bill Holder paintings
- 3. The donation of one Jeff Wilson painting
- **4.** The Pubble People mural at the Okotoks Recreation Centre
- **5.** The Canada Mural Mosaic train mural celebrating Canada's 150th birthday at the Pason Arena
- **6.** Five "Art in the Hall" exhibit spaces in Town of Okotoks properties.
- **7.** The Salute to Our Veterans memorial wall on Veteran's Way.
- **8.** The Paint-a-Potty project in collaboration with Ecole Secondaire Foothills Composite High School/Alberta High School of Fine Arts



Further, several municipal changes have occurred over the past 13 years including a revised growth model, a community visioning exercise, and the creation of Growing Together: A Culture, Heritage & Arts Master Plan (CHAMP II) which will guide the Town of Okotoks for the next 15 to 20 years.

Item C1 in CHAMP II is "Develop public art policy & program." Culture and Heritage Services began to accomplish this in the fall of 2018 by engaging the community through a survey and a daylong public art session designed to inform and gather information from residents

This What We Heard Report presents the results of these engagements.

SURVEY METHOD

In September 2018, the Town of Okotoks issued a survey to the public with the following questions:

1 People have different understandings public art. What do you think about public art?

2 What places would you like to see public art as part of the community?

3 What type of public art would be the best for Okotoks?

4 How would you like to be involved with public art in Okotoks?

5 Why did you choose your top ranked selection to quesiton four?

6 In what ways to you want to learn about public art in Okotoks?

7 How should the public art be paid for?

8 Do you have any other comments?



Sixty -eight people responded to the survey. This represents 0.23% of Okotoks 29,002 population (2018).

The following section presents a summary of those results and then identifies themes of responses with analysis.

Verbatim responses follow the thematic analysis.

"Public art provides a flavour to a community." -- Survey Response



SURVEY ANALYSIS

Overall this survey shows that respondents are in support of public art in general. However, a 0.23% response rate is low. This could be for various reasons, including:

- 1) Okotokians accept public art as presented
- 2) Public art is not a high priority for Okotokians
- **3)** Okotoks residents are experiencing "survey fatigue," or
- **4)** The survey took place in late August through September when many residents were away on holidays or active returning to work and school.

Question one included eighteen questions about potential roles public art can play in Okotoks. The survey respondents suggested that public art can or does play a significant role in the lives of people in the community. Responses ranged from 39% of respondents saying that public art connects them to visitors and neighbors to 90% saying that it beautifies the community. Only five percent of responses said that public art is not something the community should support and 3% said they do not like public art. Sixty-five respondents answered this question and three skipped.

Question two queried respondents about where public art should be located. The survey revealed strong support of public art in places where people gather or pass by and that this can serve as an identifier. Eighty-nine percent recommended that downtown placement was important with a low of 5% responding that the community did not need public art. Sixty-six respondents answered this question and two skipped.



Question three considered what type of public art would be best for Okotoks with eighty-five percent of respondents focusing less on the actual type of art, but rather that Okotoks is best enlivened with art created by Alberta artists. This suggests that art and artists be selected using a method that includes a territorial anchoring, perhaps limiting the scope of Requests for Proposals to the province. The second most popular selection was murals or paintings, with functional art rising to the top of the survey. Only 6% said that public art was not suited for Okotoks. Sixty-five respondents answered this question and three skipped.

Question four asked how respondents would like to be involved in the public art process. Clearly, respondents want to be engaged in the art selection and location selection process. Sixtyone percent of respondents desired to be involved in both the selection of the art and the selection of the location. (Cont.)



SURVEY ANALYSIS

(Cont.) Several respondents skipped this question, suggesting involvement was less important than other elements of the process; however, responses to question five contradict this analysis. (This is addressed the Survey Themes section of this document.)

Sixty-one respondents answered this question and seven skipped.

Question five asked why respondents answered the way they did to question four. This question gauged what the community wanted and how they wanted to be involved. Culture and Heritage Services categorized the responses into 11 common themes. Each response that addressed the theme was given a score of one (1).

The themes were:

Want to be involved in selection and/or placement

Support -- responses stated support for public art.

Vibrant Community -- responses suggested that public art enhanced community in some way.

Do Not Support -- responses stated they did not support for public art.

Do Not Want To Be Involved -- responses stated they did not support for public art.

Municipal Lead --respondent felt the Town of Okotoks should solely lead the process.

Fund -- respondents mentioned anything about how public art should, or should not, be funded.



Govern -- respondents commented on anything to do with how public art should be governed in Okotoks.

Public Lead -- respondent felt the public should solely lead the process.

Inform & Engage -- respondent felt wanted to learn more but not necessarily be involved in the process.

Did Not Like Survey --respondent commented on the survey being faulty.

Fifty-six respondents answered question, 12 skipped.

Question six asked how respondents would like to learn about public art. Responses suggested that the best method to reach people was through Facebook and the Town of Okotoks Website. The top choices by respondents were social media with 35% and the Town of Okotoks website with 29%. The newspaper came in third with a significant drop to less than 10%. Other answers were negligible. All sixty-eight respondents answered this question.

Question seven asked where public art funding should come from. Federal and Provincial grants* received the most support with 83%, with private donations (78%) and the Town of Okotoks (71%) coming in second and third. Sponsorship came in fourth with 67% support. Less than 5% of respondents said tax dollars should not be used to support public art. Sixty-eight respondents answered question.

Question eight asked whether respondents has any other comments, presenting an open forum for any areas not addressed. Responses were categorized into eight common themes and scored one when the response addressed the theme.

The themes were:

Vibrant Community -- responses suggested that public art enhanced community in some way.

Support -- respondents stated support for public art.

Fund -- respondents mentioned anything about how public art should, or should not, be funded.

Want to be involved in selection and/or placement -respondent stated they wanted to be involved in selection and/or placement of public art.

Support Local --respondent stated that they preferred art created by local/provincial artists.

* Being that Federal an Provincial grants are most often matching grants, the Town would need to lead this process likely even if matching funds were presented by a private donation.



What should the art look like --respondent commented on public art's appearance.

Do Not Support -- respondent stated they did not support for public art.

Inform & Engage -- respondent felt wanted to learn more but not necessarily be involved in the process.

Thirty-five respondents answered this question; thirty-three did not.

QUESTION 5 THEMES

Why did you choose your answer to number 4?
