The data below showcases a relatively consistent complaint volume and breakdown of resulting actions related to <u>Deer and Wildlife Feeding and Attractants Bylaw 28-21</u> from 2022 to 2023. Complaint volume related to deer and wildlife feeding make up less than 1% of total complaints across 2022 and 2023.

Municipal Enforcement will continue to monitor and respond to violators of this Bylaw with deliberate communication and an education first approach. The intent is to ensure voluntary compliance to help reduce human-wildlife conflicts and improve the enjoyment of private property and public health and safety.

* Based on the Urban Deer Taskforce report and recommendations in July 2021, the Deer and Wildlife Feeding and Attractants Bylaw 28-21 was passed to regulate the intentional and unintentional feeding of deer and other wildlife on private property. The intent is to lessen the impact of urban deer on private property where intentional and unintentional feeding has caused deer to become habituated and unresponsive to current deer-deterrent measures.
