# Okotoks Municipal Enforcement 2023 Annual Report





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## Introduction

In the wake of the post-pandemic era, Okotoks and subsequently Okotoks Municipal Enforcement (OME) have faced a myriad of challenges. Yet, it is through these challenges that we have discovered opportunities for innovative approaches in upholding and advancing public safety.

The role of Municipal Enforcement in Okotoks saw a big shift this year. We had dived into reshaping how we do things internally – from tweaking processes and adding resources to reorganizing our leadership and team structure. ## **Core Milestones**

- 1. With deliberate consultation and collaboration efforts, OME developed its first five-year (2024-2029) Business Plan which included Mission, Vision, and Values.
- 2. Five officers joined the OME team to replace a significant turnover.
- 3. Based on a provincial initiative to modernize traffic enforcement operations, OME has implemented an electronic ticketing system in enforcement vehicles. This has improved client and officer safety, as well as process efficiency with ~46% of issued fines in 2023 resulting from electronic tickets.




## **OME Staffing**

Okotoks Municipal Enforcement (OME) staffing was strengthened in 2023 with the hiring of three (3) Peace Officers to fill vacancies and bring the workforce up to compliment. Hours of service and scheduling were re-evaluated, and a new schedule was implemented to better accommodate service coverage in conjunction with team numbers.

#### **Professional Standards**

Okotoks Municipal Enforcement reports all public complaints involving peace officer conduct and use of force to the Province of Alberta Peace Officer Program. Use of force is considered a last resort when all other measures of achieving compliance have been exhausted or an individual uses force against a peace officer.



In 2023, Okotoks Municipal Enforcement did not have any professional standards investigations to report.

# **Service Statistics**

## Assistance to the RCMP

In 2023, during traffic stops, OME officers required the assistance of the RCMP when dealing with impaired drivers. The RCMP Radio Communications Pilot Project is moving into the next stages of the project. OME officers will continue to have radio access to the RCMP as an increased safety tool for Community Peace Officers.

# Community Outreach and Education

Officers invested approximately six (6) hours per day in school zones to demonstrate a visible presence to deter speeding and encourage a safer environment for other road users. Okotoks has a high adolescent demographic, and a majority of community outreach is focused on youth. Officer presence in schools fosters positive relationships and provides a way to impart safety related education.

## Anti-Graffiti Program


In the summer of 2022, there was an unprecedented increase in graffiti on public property. Across 2023, OME officers diligently investigated graffiti files and were instrumental in identifying





perpetrators who were subsequently charged or assigned community service restitution. Complaints data comparing 2023 to 2022 showcases a reduction in graffiti complaints, as seen below.

Figure 1 - Graffiti Complaints 2023





## Traffic Initiatives

Throughout 2023, traffic enforcement continued as an operational priority for OME. Data obtained through traffic count/speed studies provided OME with insight into problematic areas and allowed for targeted traffic enforcement.

- Substantial increase in speeding related violations in 2023 as compared to 2022 (n=34%).
- Compared to 2022, the data follows a similar seasonality, with much of the increase taking place Jan-Jul and Oct-Dec.
- Increases observed in later months of 2023 correlate with implementation of the E-Ticketing program within the Town. This is a provincially led initiative towards modernization efforts.
